COMMUNITY DISPENSARY

The construction of the Two Sisters Dispensary experienced delays due to the tendering process and administrative changes. However, recent developments indicate that the project is set to commence very soon. A contractor has been identified, marking a significant step forward. The contractor has already visited the site, conducting an initial assessment and planning the groundwork. This visit signifies readiness and commitment to begin the construction. Given these developments, we anticipate that the construction of the dispensary will commence within the month of April.

This progress is a positive step toward improving healthcare access in the community. The timely completion of the dispensary will provide essential medical services to residents, enhancing their overall well-being. Further updates on the construction milestones will be provided as the work progresses.



FGM TRAINING AND GRADUATION

The Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) training program has been ongoing for some time, providing young girls (and boys) with critical knowledge and awareness about the dangers and consequences of this harmful practice. Through these training sessions, the participants have gained a deeper understanding of FGM as a violation of their rights and a destructive cultural practice that needs to be eradicated. As a result of this initiative, young girls are empowered to make informed decisions, rejecting FGM and advocating for a future free from this tradition. More activities to support the girls will follow in the coming months. We look forward to their graduation later in the year, a momentous occasion that marks their commitment to standing against FGM and becoming ambassadors of change in their communities.

The upcoming graduation will celebrate their resilience, courage, and determination to promote positive cultural transformation. It will also serve as a platform to encourage more community members and neighboring villages to join the fight against FGM and uphold the rights and dignity of girls and women.

TWO SISTERS SCHOOL EASTER HOLIDAY CLOSURE

Two Sisters School officially closed on 2nd April for the Easter holiday. During this break, learners will return home to spend time with their families and assist in various household and community activities.

Given the pastoral lifestyle of many families in the region, the learners will take part in herding animals and supporting their parents in other essential chores.
